Dr Andrew Collins



Andrew is the Head of School of Optometry for the Bachelor of Optometry and Vision Science programme at the University of Auckland. He is a registered optometrist and has worked in the School of Optometry and Vision Science at the University since 1994. His primary area of research is the development of myopia (short-sight), in particular the effects of environmental factors including light exposure on myopia development. Andrew is a member of the New Zealand Association of Optometrists and the Cornea and Contact Lens Society (NZ).

Professor Jennifer Craig



Jennifer qualified as an optometrist in Scotland in 1992, was awarded a PhD in 1995 from Glasgow Caledonian University, and completed her postgraduate ocular therapeutic training in Auckland in 2009. Jennifer is a Professor in the Department of Ophthalmology at the University of Auckland. She teaches both optometry and medical students at undergraduate and postgraduate level, and heads the Ocular Surface Laboratory, conducting and supervising research into aspects of the anterior eye with a particular interest in the tear film and dry eye. Jennifer regularly delivers continuing education and research lectures nationally and internationally, and publishes in both the scientific and clinical press. She is a past chair of the Optometrists and Dispensing Opticians Board of New Zealand.

Alex is the Deputy Head of School and Chair Course Standards Committee in the School of Medicine at Deakin University. He was the inaugural Course Director of Deakin's Optometry program. His primary research interest is in refractive error development and myopia. His teaching duties include ocular disease and therapeutics and he has a longstanding interest in curriculum design. Alex is a graduate of City University, London and he qualified as an optometrist following a pre-registration year at Moorfields Eye Hospital. His PhD was obtained through the University of Wales, Cardiff and he completed further postgraduate qualifications in Ocular Therapeutics and University Teaching during his time at the University of Melbourne. After completing her optometry degree in 2004, she has become a pioneer for her people in the field of optometry, working in rural parts of Australia conducting school screenings and providing spectacles and eye care for Indigenous patients in remote clinics. Shannon is currently working in private practice in Ayr Queensland.

Linda's career has included 20 years as the Head of the Business School in three tertiary institutions. Concurrently, she held governance positions with the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants including National President in 2009.
